Hello Staton Parents:

Great news! The School Organizational Team (SOT) members approved the School Plan of Operation which includes the School Performance Plan and Strategic Budget. Additionally, the SOT voted to add an additional teacher for the 2017-2018 school year to reduce a class size which will be funded from PTO Fundraising efforts.

Staton's total Kindergarten through fifth grade student enrollment must equate to 728 students or greater for count day in the fall to maintain the funding for the 2017-2018 school year. Naturally, if it is lower, we lose funding and if it is higher we gain funding in the fall. Keep in mind that all salaries are NOT based upon actual salaries, but a district average, which includes monies for employee benefits. In addition, schools DO NOT budget for grant funded positions and special education (including G.A.T.E.) because this is funded with federal monies. That being said, the breakdown below is how the School Organization team, with surveyed input from the staff and parents, decided to spend the allocated money for the 2017-2018 school year:

\$ 3,515,349.26 Allocated in Strategic Budget based on enrollment of 728

\$242,743.12 1 Office Manager, 1 Clerk, 1 School Aide, 1 FASA, 1 Library Aide, and 1 PE Assistant

\$2,968,515.25 36 Licensed Positions

\$11,990.00 School wide Intervention, Assessment and Technology Programs

Funded from PTO fundraising.

Furthermore, the School Organizational Team wanted to learn more about the role of Certified Temporary Tutors (CTT's) and the support they provide to both our teachers and students. In the upcoming weeks, there will be more conversations and discussions with grade levels and the SOT about the effectiveness and importance of these positions to help support our students. The total number of CTT's and support will be determined in the upcoming School Organizational Team meetings.

The SOT meeting minutes will completely detail all of the above and will be on our website in approximately a week. Again, the budget is subject to change based on fall enrollment after count day has been completed.

Please be assured the School Organizational Team has greatly valued the input from all stakeholders including teachers, support staff, and parents during this process and we have utilized that input to formulate a school performance plan that best serves the needs of our school. This has been a passionate and engaging process for all involved, and just reiterates how committed we all are to our students. We are grateful for and look forward to your continued support as we move forward with these collective goals.

While technology can be a great tool, it can also be used in a negative way. Unfortunately, we have had some incidents involving social media recently. Things have been posted that are unkind and led to rumors and gossip. This has caused issues to arise in the classroom, impacting the learning environment for some students. While this doesn't involve everyone, it is important for all of us as parents to be aware of the potential problems and dangers of social media and the affects it can have on our children. Listed below are a few reading strategies you can implement at home with your Staton Pioneer(s);

Provide a special time for you and your child to enjoy literacy activities including reading, writing, listening, and/or speaking.

Become a fan of libraries – both the school library and the local public library. Participate in your libraries' early learning activities aimed at developing literacy skills for your child.

Enrich conversations with your child through the art of questioning (even when involved in regular activities such as grocery shopping). Ask who, what, where, and why questions before, during, and after reading.
